Bigger boats to visit Brockhole

A HIGH-TECH FLOATING passenger jetty for Brockhole is nearing completion on Windermere's eastern shore. The structure is designed to allow passengers to disembark from the very largest lake steamers at the National Park Visitor Centre - something not possible until now.

The jetty is anchored to the lake bed, buts floats on the surface, which will ensure safe and easy access even as the lake water level changes throughout the year. This impressive piece of engineering is intended to withstand the major sideways forces exerted when MV 'Swan' or 'Teal' gets blown alongside in heavy weather - quite a feat!

The hope is that more visitors will be encouraged to leave their cars in the car park and explore Windermere and its surroundings by boat, bus and bike.

Warm welcome from our New Mayor

THE TOWN COUNCIL has seen some changes as a result of the recent elections. I would like to thank those members who have served on the Council and now stood down, as well as those people who were prepared to stand for election but were unsuccessful in the elections.

The public toilets are still open in Windermere and Bowness because the Town Council, working in partnership with Bowness and Windermere Community Care Trust, has agreed in principle to take on the leases from SLDC to run the toilets as a social enterprise. This is a new model of working but we hope that the community will rally round to support the partnership. It may have some cost consequences for ratepayers as the Town Council will need to raise money in the future to help fund some of the running costs.

Town Council has also agreed to take on land to create a small number of allotments behind Orrest Drive flats. A working group has been formed to steer the work needed to fence and layout the allotments so that the plots can be a source of pride for the community and encourage further pieces of land to be identified for use as allotments.

Plans for the judging and presentation of awards for Windermere in Bloom are well advanced. The hanging baskets on the lamp posts on the main routes are paid for by the Town Council. We hope you feel they add to the attractiveness of the area.

Town Council continues to develop its role and deliver the Community Plan drawn up by residents. To improve communications the Council is setting up a website so that we have a dedicated site for minutes and agendas, as well as councillors' contact details.

I cannot close my first report without saying a big "thank you" to Bill Smith who has served as Mayor for three years. Bill represented the council at many events and sat on lots of working groups. He gave of his time willingly and raised the profile of the work of the council. Bill continues on the Town Council as councillor for Applethwaite & Troutbeck ward.

I was delighted to be elected as Mayor at the May meeting. I shall endeavour to do my best to serve the council and community to the best of my ability.

Storrs Park architectural gems in the spotlight

BLACKWELL. THE **CRAFT** ARTS & HOUSE, celebrating ten of public years with access an exhibition of the work of two outstanding Arts & Crafts architect-**CFA** designers: Voysey, designer of **Broadleys** (pictured), now home of the Windermere Motor Boat Racina Club, Blackwell's architect, Mackay Hugh Baillie Scott.



The exhibition, which runs at Blackwell until 31 October 2011, centres around the houses designed by Baillie Scott and Voysey for the Storrs Park development above Bowness, which successfully fulfilled the developers' intention of attracting an affluent clientele to the area.

The exhibition looks at the 'manifestos' of both men - Voysey's Individuality and Baillie Scott's Houses and Gardens - and their relationships with Arthur Simpson, master cabinet-maker, who in 1886 set up his Kendal workshops.

Simpson was the natural choice for Baillie Scott when commissioning the decorative woodwork for Blackwell that is one of its greatest attractions. In his turn, Voysey designed furniture that Simpson would execute (as well as the decorative woodwork for several of the houses designed by Voysey), and theirs was a relationship that developed into a friendship which endured until Simpson's death.

Speed warning for local motorists

EARLIER THIS YEAR the local policing team spent several months monitoring speeding vehicles on the A592 at Ferney Green and on Lake Road between Windermere and Bowness.

Speeding at these locations has been identified as a problem for local people, and is an obvious road safety concern. People who use the road regularly will have seen the orange speed indicator device, and may have seen officers checking vehicle speeds and speaking to motorists.

Most of the vehicles stopped because they are exceeding 30mph were driven by people who live in the LA23 postcode area. Police report they even stopped some drivers in excess of 40mph on Lake Road.


A 40mph collision with a pedestrian will kill or cause very serious injury.

The message from the police team is very simple: "Show consideration. Drive within the speed limit and take account of the conditions - 30mph can be too fast on a wet road, for example.

"And if you exceed 30mph on the roads in Windermere then expect to be stopped and to face the consequences".
