THE NATIONAL PARK AUTHORITY is organising a further opportunity for local people to comment on proposals that part of Windermere village should become a conservation area.

An exhibition will be held on Tuesday 8 March 2011 at the Marchesi Centre from 6pm to 9pm. Views and comments should be returned to David James at the LDNPA, Murley Moss, Oxenholme Road, Kendal LA9 7RL or email david.james@lakedistrict.gov.uk by Friday 25 March 2011.

National Park Conservation and Design Adviser David James said "We are holding a further exhibition as we want everyone to appreciate what a conservation area would involve and have the opportunity to have their say about the proposals."

A detailed appraisal of Windermere's special qualities has already been produced to highlight what makes the area worthy of being designated as a conservation area. Full details - including maps of the proposed Conservation Area boundary, a suggested management plan and an explanation of the proposed benefits of a conservation area – can be found at www.lakedistrict.gov.uk/windermereca and an online survey questionnaire is also available.

"A conservation area would help conserve historic buildings and trees and provide opportunities for further enhancement. With tighter budgets, future funding for enhancements, such as further improvements within the town centre, are likely to be targeted toward designated areas", David added.

Make your own Fruit Trees!

'FRUITY WINDERMERE' organisers the Windermere Food Group is masterminding a fruit grafting workshop at the Ladyholme Centre on Sunday 13th March, starting at 10.30am.

Grafting involves fixing a fruit variety of your choice on to a new rootstock to ensure healthy growth of the right-sized plant. It is not difficult and is a cheap and easy way to create your own fruit trees. There will be apple, plum and pear varieties available for grafting, together with suitable rootstocks.

It will cost £3 for the grafting tuition, with an extra charge if you want to take your handiwork home. You will need to take a sharp penknife or Stanley knife and some gardening gloves.

If you lease your car to the Car Club, you get:

- •You will be paid 25% of any hourly usage revenue generated in excess of £2000

A Car Club works by people joining and paying a membership fee and then using Club cars on an hourly basis. The cars can be booked by phone or on the internet. Car Clubs are popular as they save you money and reduce pressure on parking space.

Osprey getting ready for Re-launch

LAKELAND ARTS TRUST has been working hard on a project to replace the old Steamboat Museum buildings and reopen the site to the public.

The project will enable visitors to see the collection of vessels dating from the Middle Ages through to the 20th century, finding out who owned them and how they were built and used on Windermere. Visitors will be able to watch and learn about the process of boat building and conservation in the workshop, explore the wet dock and jetties see different boats demonstrated or take a trip on an historic launch. There will also be opportunities to learn about the heritage through workshops,

activities and talks as well being able to enjoy being on the site and its beautiful location.

Adrian Stone started in February 2010 as the Museum's Conservation Workshop Manager, getting to know the collection of some 40 vessels that all need caring for. Windermere steam launch Osprey is now being restored in the workshop on-site. Adrian is currently sourcing teak and oak to replace hull planking and structural elements, although a large proportion of the

original planking will be preserved. Work will continue on Osprey over the coming months and she will hopefully be re-launched later in 2011.

Whilst this development work continues throughout 2011, the Trust will be offering opportunities to visit the site through guided tours and open days. Further details about these will be published locally and on the website, www.steamboats.org.uk in the spring.

stopping to say 'hello' or working with partner agencies to come up with solutions for community problems.

PCSOs work as part of Neighbourhood Policing Teams and are focussed on working with local communities to identify the issues they face and work with them and partner agencies to tackle those problems.

A Flash in the Pan

Plans to secure the future delivery of nine toilets across Windermere and Bowness, by developing a partnership between Bowness & Windermere Community Care Trust and South Lakes Development Trust, have hit troubled waters.

A decision taken by South Lakeland District Council on lease terms for three toilet blocks means that the plans developed to attract upgrade investment for the most well-used toilet blocks to justify a 'pay on entry' service are no longer viable.

As a result the partnership would not be able to generate the income needed to subsidise the operation of the remaining six facilities.

The consequence is that the only realistic option (as we go to press) would be a major hike in Town Council taxation, putting the costs of operating the toilets on local people, rather than on those using the facilities.

The partnership is still hoping that SLDC will work towards a deliverable social enterprise solution. But without an offer from SLDC of all nine toilets on secure leases, the opportunities to keep all our toilets open look slim.

County Council seeking major savings

SAVING £44 MILLION

Cumbria County Council's government funding is set to reduce significantly, so the council has been consulting with people about how to save £44 million on its budget.

Feedback is being collated as The Hub goes to press - Cabinet will consider the feedback before it agrees a final council Plan and budget to recommend to Full Council in late February.

LOW COST BUS FARES FOR YOUNG PEOPLE South Lakeland young people can take advantage of low cost bus fares with the new A2BNoW scheme.

A2BNoW offers young people aged 5 to 18 fares of up to £1 single or £1.80 return on any journey in South Lakeland. A2BNoW smartcard holders can use them on any return journey to Penrith, Keswick, Barrow, Kirkby Stephen and Lancaster, as long as their journey starts in South Lakeland. The card costs just £5 as a one-off fee, and can be used anytime except during school term times before 9:30am and between 3pm and 5pm.

Pupils at Goodly Dale School have been celebrating their recent award for 'Outstanding Development of the International Dimension in the Curriculum'.

The award reflects the breadth of intenational activities in the school curriculum. Pupils have been forging links with the Kinamba Nursery Project in Rwanda, celebrating Chinese New Year, learning Spanish, hosting a visit by Swiss students and finding out about French language and Culture. Pupils also participated in sponsored 'Walk for Water' events to raise funds for countries where better water provision is desperately needed.

An 'International Day' in school included many pupils wearing national dress from other countries, preparation of international foods, displays of dance and art and the enthusiastic involvement of parents.

"The pupils have not only enjoyed all these and other related activities, but very clearly feel that they have learned a great deal about how different and difficult life can be in other countries," said Chair of Governors Dorothy Hill. "Pupils described the 'Walk for Water' as life changing and increasing their awareness of the need to conserve water. They also discovered how difficult it is to carry quantities of water for any length of time!"

Pupils commented: "It feels good to help somebody else do something", "You feel good about yourself" and "It will help me to understand the world as I grow up".


