## Call to ACTION

Recent changes in the delivery of local services, concerns over increasing rural and social isolation, the difficulties experienced by those suffering with dementia and the lack of nursing home provision in our immediate area are some of the key issues that have been identified in a plan developed by The Central Lakes Local Action Partnership.

In addition, the opportunity to support and promote intergenerational projects and support healthy lifestyle choices for young people have also been included in the plan which would like to see local schools and colleges developing career qualifications to encourage young people to take a caring and rewarding role within the wider community.

The partnership has evolved from the original Central Lakes Local Area Partnership and brings together elected representatives from ALL layers of our local governance, including South Lakeland District Council, Cumbria County Council, Lakes Parish Council, Skelwith Parish Council and Windermere Town Council. Recent changes in focus of the Partnership reflect its desire to develop its role as a strong and credible voice capable of taking action to motivate positive responses to address issues impacting on us all.

One of the immediate priorities is the development of our local area to become a Dementia Friendly environment to help raise awareness, understanding and removal of the stigma that surrounds the condition.

At its most recent meeting the impact of on street parking charges to those using local services such as libraries, community development centres and even shops in the towns themselves was discussed. Genuine concern was expressed that paying for on-street parking to those using our towns would materially impact on many of the most vulnerable members of our community, adding to their costs and those of the volunteers helping address their needs. Those present at the meeting voted unanimously in their opposition to the implementation of on-street parking charges.

## Langstone lives?

In the Spring issue of the Hub we asked if anyone had any alternative ideas concerning the future use of Langstone House in Windermere other than providing opportunity for conversion to affordable homes. Here are a few of the suggestions...



It could be used as a community/adult training space similar to the very successful Community Development Centre at Ambleside Library. It already has disabled access and ground floor space that could easily be converted to offer a wide range of training possibilities.

Alternatively its use as a meeting 'HUB' for local youngsters (11-18) as a safe, social space was suggested by younger representatives from our community. The opportunity to meet up with friends, do their homework, learn new skills, play games and meet new people being some of the potential activities that could take place. It would help ensure that larger groups of children/teens would not be seen to be 'loitering' but actually be involved within a creative, friendly and supportive environment.

When not being used by the young people of Windermere it could deliver family workshops, parenting classes, a play group, parent support group, a toy library - ultimately all for the benefit of our future generations.

The basement at Langstone House holds workshop potential – for ventures such as 'Men in Sheds' type projects or a base for the bench repair work being carried out in co-operation with our excellent local police community support team.

As a whole the building offers tremendous ongoing potential to support community activities and the Town Council will actively be pursuing discussions with South Lakeland District about its future.

## Millerground gets TLC

Millerground on the eastern lake shore of Lake Windermere is one of the oldest public access points around the Lake. It offers a peaceful natural environment providing pleasant and enjoyable recreation for everyone. Many years ago it was an open area enjoyed by residents and visitors offering stunning views of the lake. It provided recreational facilities for boating, canoeing, bathing, taking a pleasant lakeshore walk, having a picnic on the hill or generally just enjoying the scenery.

Over the last few years, despite best efforts, it has become run down. Shrubs and trees have become overgrown, pathways and steps have eroded, signage is unclear and general easy access has deteriorated. In an attempt to restore its former splendour, the Windermere and Bowness Civic Society has started a community project.

Millerground Enhancement Group aims to involve local students and residents in practical tasks to improve the area under the guidance of the National Trust and SLDC. This will involve resurfacing pathways, treating and repairing woodwork, litter picking, clearing brush and brambles, planting wildflowers and general maintenance tasks.



So far they have had five working sessions at Millerground with students from Windermere School coming along to help. Members of the Civic Society, Town Council, National Trust, SLDC and the public also participated. To date they have worked on pathways, gate access and planted over 2000 native bluebells!

## Calling all Wombles...

## Green fingers

The way that you pursue your gardening activities can either help or hinder the aim to improve local water quality. Some fertilisers consist of up to a third phosphate in their chemical composition and can lead to lake pollution if they run off gardens and into streams and lakes. Here are some 'green' gardening tips:



- Check the weather before applying fertiliser or manure so it's not applied before heavy rain
- If your land borders a stream or lake, consider a fertiliser-free margin as a further precaution
- Soil also has phosphate in it, so try to stop it washing into watercourses where it can also contribute to sedimentation issues. Keep all your precious soil in your garden!
- Use peat-free composts – we need to conserve our dwindling peat supplies as they serve valuable functions in the environment including conserving water and locking up carbon
- Recycle the phosphate in urine! This approach may be going too far for some green-fingered readers, however urine is full of phosphate and if diluted 1 to 10 with water it can provide free and nutritious plant feed!
- Look at organic alternatives to pesticides – they kill beneficial insects as well as the pests

There is a wealth of information available about how to replace chemical and phosphate-based fertilisers and pesticides with organic equivalents. You can look on the Garden Organic, Soil Association and RHS websites.

## Growing for gold

After great success over the past two years in the Britain in Bloom contest we can now concentrate on making our local area the best and most beautiful place by focussing our efforts on a successful Windermere in Bloom competition.

To celebrate Britain in Bloom's 50th anniversary the RHS is encouraging community groups across the UK to plant golden pollinator-friendly flowers in public spaces this year. So as people start planting for the Windermere in Bloom competition it is hoped that a golden theme may be used!

## Meals on Wheels!

Following removal of the support given by Cumbria County Council to the **Meals on Wheels** service in Windermere the service has been revamped.

From 1st April 2014, the County Council disposed of the service to CAMEO Day Care for the Elderly. It is still to be run from the Marchesi Centre on Holly Road Windermere and will continue to operate on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, the days that the new Windermere service does not operate.

Unlike the traditional Meals on Wheels Service there will be no petty restrictions on eligibility and this is an opportunity to ensure that individuals who might otherwise go without a hot meal can now benefit from a hot, home delivered meal, Monday to Friday.






