The Lake District Holocaust Project

The Lake District Holocaust Project reopened in June after some alterations to rooms on the first floor of Windermere Library. A permanent exhibition called "From Auschwitz to Ambleside" is on display and tells the story of the child Holocaust Survivors who came to the Lake District in 1945. Everyone is very welcome to come and share in a remarkable success story for Windermere.

The exhibition also includes the story of Calgarth Estate, where the children stayed, and how the history of the estate was closely connected to the history of flying boats on Windermere from 1909 through to the WW2 Short Sunderland factory at White Cross Bay.

During the summer the exhibition attracted many, many visitors from around the world including The US, Canada, France, The Netherlands, Germany, Italy, Israel, India, China and Taiwan. Some very special guests included some of the Jewish children themselves, and their family and friends.

The Lake District Holocaust Project is a charity and carries out a variety of work both in the exhibition / work space, in the library and in schools. There are plans to show films and put on more special events in the space and to work closely with the library to develop its potential as a vibrant community resource.

Volunteers are always welcome to help deliver the activities of the project. The help needed could be anything from being able to offer a couple of hours minding the gallery to serving cups of tea during events. In 1844, the terminus of the Windermere Railway was planned to go from Kendal through to the Low Wood, near Ambleside. Objections to this route from landowners and William Wordsworth, plus high engineering costs meant the line never got beyond the hamlet of 'Birthwaite'. Having been forced to terminate the line, the railway company quickly realised the promotional value of the Lake's name and the town of 'Windermere' was born. After 170 years people still ask where the lake is!

The railway company believed that they would extend the line from Windermere to Keswick or Penrith, so Windermere station was designed as a 'through' station with buildings either side and not across the end. Abraham Pattinson built the station in 1847 along with The Windermere Hotel. The railway was a huge success and the station and town grew to accommodate the increasing numbers of people and trades. The first post office, bookstall and other retail outlets were to be found in the station. There was a Smithy and Farrier to help maintain the horses – some of this building exists today as the Golf Shop. Where Lakeland Ltd is now, there were warehouses to store dry goods and sidings to handle the huge amounts of coal demanded by local dwellings and the gas works. Local agriculture and industries used the railway to import fertiliser, livestock and machinery and to export farm produce, slate, gunpowder and timber.

Platforms were extended and sidings built to store excursion trains. Up to 17 excursion trains would arrive on a Sunday and others on weekdays along with a daily service to major cities. At one time this included four through trains from London, 'The Lakes Express' and as many as 14 local return shuttles between Windermere and Oxenholme. By 1885 it was estimated some 800,000 people had passed through Windermere Station in a year!

By the 1960's, railways were in a state of decline. Windermere suffered a fall in passenger numbers and goods traffic dwindled as the motor car and the lorry took over. The Windermere goods yard closed in 1969. Steam was replaced by diesel. In 1973, the rails from Oxenholme were reduced to a single track, with enough foresight to allow clearance under bridges thus allowing for conversion to electric power, an option currently being debated.

In 1980, the Windermere station buildings were sold and now form the core of Booths. In 1986, a new station was built along Platform 2. This arrangement not being without risk as in 2010 a maintenance train overshot the buffers in a rumoured attempt to breach the wall of the Wine and Spirits department!

This year is the 40th anniversary of the publication of Wainwright's Coast to Coast Walk. Last year, The Wainwright Society secured permission to way mark the route and work on this project has been on-going throughout this year. To help raise the profile of the Walk, the Society has placed new information boards at each end of the route: at St Bees and Robin Hood's Bay. Money for these projects has come from the Society's annual Challenge and also sales of the 2014 Calendar.

Any remaining funds after completion of these projects will be donated to the nine **Mountain Rescue Teams** that provide invaluable emergency assistance along the line of the route.

Caring about change



Bowness & Windermere Community Care Trust are involved in developing a number of exciting projects to help ensure that our community is not left behind as pressure on the public sector impacts on service delivery.

Holding true to its objectives to "promote the wellbeing of our local

community by engaging, responding, caring and serving" the Trust already provides the excellent facilities of The Phoenix Centre and Phoenix Field, manages the delivery of all 8 of our local public toilets, provides a weekly Luncheon Club at the Carver Church and a coffee morning style Drop-in at the Methodist Hall in Windermere.

In addition, the Trust has recently facilitated the introduction of "Windermeals" which, in association with the Elleray Hotel, can provide a three course meal for just £5.00 to anyone over 60. It is hoped that the scheme will help ensure that individuals who might otherwise go without a hot meal, but are not eligible for Meals on Wheels, benefit from this 'no strings' service delivered directly to them by volunteers. The service will be available on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Alongside this, the Trust is working with a group of local people to investigate opportunities to ensure that **Queens Park** can continue to provide for the needs of those using it and continue to offer the range of excellent facilities needed to meet local demand.

The Phoenix Centre itself is increasingly being used as a venue for children's birthday parties as well as the venue for regular dance activities provided by Silver Web Academy of Dance and children's musical activities with Rhythm Time. The Centre is also home to the Windermere Weight Training Club, The Heathwaite Junior Football Club, Windermere Sea Scouts and the Windermere Youth Project.

The kitchen at the Phoenix has recently been upgraded and with excellent toilets and baby changing facilities and a large car park, the venue is ideal for sporting or dance events. The hall is even tall enough to accommodate a bouncy castle which makes it ideal for parties throughout the year.

In touch, at home

Gatesbield Quaker Housing Association celebrated 30 years of Sheltered Housing in Windermere this year. In March, as part of their celebrations, they launched a brand new Community Outreach Project – Gatesbield at Home.

Gatesbield at Home is a Community Alarm Service for older people living in the Windermere and Bowness area.

What will make their service special?

Gatesbield has teamed up with St Gregory's Homecare and Broxbourne Community Alarms to provide a 24-hour emergency response, including a personal response from an experienced carer should there be an emergency through the night.

The service can also include a regular visit from a Gatesbield Warden and the option of a daily telephone call during short periods of ill health or when family are away on holiday.

Members can also access the community facilities at Gatesbield, including for a midday meal.
