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#### Flowers of Auschwitz



A marquee on the grounds of Windermere Library was the venue for the commemoration of the seventieth anniversary of the arrival in the Lake District of three hundred child Holocaust Survivors who arrived from the horrors of Eastern Europe on the 14th August 1945. The Windermere Boys, as they became known, were provided accommodation at the then Calgarth Estate, now the site of Lakes School, and they hold many memories of the welcome they were given. Trevor Avery & Rose Smith are the first British artists to gain access to, and be given permission to film, the greenhouses of former German Nazi concentration camp Raisko, now returned to its original name of Rajsko, sited near Auschwitz State Museum in Poland. The film, and that of film intervention "Nacht und Nebel" by internationally renowned artist Miroslaw Balka (courtesy of the artist and White Cube) was shown as part of the exhibition.

The title for the specially produced exhibition and outdoor garden project at the Library helping to commemorate the arrival of the boys is inspired by the book of drawings of children made by Zinovii Tolkatchev, soldier, artist and liberator of Auschwitz. Limited edition prints by Alex Salgarth, inspired by a visit to Auschwitz with Lake District Holocaust Project, will be on display amongst the main permanent exhibition "From Auschwitz to Ambleside" now housed at Windermere Library. Amongst the invited guests attending the commemoration were a number of the 'Boys', their children and grandchildren. Ben Helfgott MBE who is Chairman of 45 Aid Society for Holocaust Survivors, President Holocaust Memorial Day and a Windermere Boy was one of the key speakers at the event. Flowers of Auschwitz is on show until the 31 October 2015 Opening times: Mon, Tues, Thurs: 0930-1700, Wed Closed, Sat: 1000-1300. Sun Closed (although viewing can be arranged by appointment).

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## **Commemorating 50 years**

A community celebration is planned to mark the **50th anniversary** of the opening of **The Lakes School**.

The Troutbeck Bridge based school was opened on October 8 1965 by the then Secretary of State for Education, Tony Crossland. He wanted to open the school as it was one of the first purpose-built comprehensives in the country.

Fast forward 50 years and plans are well underway to help celebrate its half century of achievement. There will be a formal marking of the

opening on Thursday October 8, exactly 50 years on, and on Saturday October 10 there will be a school and community celebration involving current and former school members.

Headteacher Andy Cunningham said: "This is a great opportunity for us to reflect the work the school has done over the past 50 years and the achievement of its pupils, past and present".

Present pupils will be involved in several school based acitivities throughout the year to help mark the special event. Ideas include replicating learning from past history topics and activities, taking an 11 plus exam, a 1960's themed sports day, the technology department sourcing old tools. Retro-timetables will be issued in student planners in September and the kitchen will do a 1960s themed service during the week of celebrations in October 2015.

It is hoped there will be events running throughout the day on October 10th, such as performances from the choir and orchestra, local bands from now and then, with equipment made available for impromtu performances. There will be photos and videos on display and also the opportunty to have a look through the school's own archives of photos and newspaper articles - you might spot a familiar face or two! There is still time to get involved in the planning and share in the contribution of photos, memories, old uniforms, stories and items. 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# Waterbird takes flight

Windermere has a proud aviation heritage which lasted until the departure of the last Windermere-built Shorts Sunderland flying-boat in 1945. Windermere's story of aviation started when two friends, Edward Wakefield and Oscar Gnosspelius attended Blackpool Airshow in 1909.



It occurred to them that flying from water would be safer but experts at Blackpool ridiculed the idea. The pair were undeterred and returned home to put their ideas into practice. Both achieved success, with Edward Wakefield's "Waterbird" taking the honours on 25 November 1911.

On 30 July, Lancaster Military Heritage Group presented an illustrated talk by Waterbird Project Director Ian Gee. Ian's talk showed that importance Windermere played in British naval and civil marine aeroplanes and explained the origins of flying from water.

The Waterbird replica seaplane is due to fly from Windermere in September with its inaugural flight scheduled for **Thursday 17th September**.

### Loo news

The toilets at Quarry Rigg in Bowness have turned out to be much busier than expected but are only accessible via steps, they do not offer disabled facilities and are well beyond their best before date.

Plans are now well advanced to materially alter the internals of the building to provide up to five separately accessible unisex toilets, each offering disabled facilities. By turning the entrance to the toilets to face Lake Road level access can be provided.

The development of the toilets is being managed by BWCCT and fully funded from reserves accumulated over the last few years from entry charges and grant receipts.

The 8 toilets cost approximately £115,000 per year to run and are used by over 350,000 people.

# Snippets from the minutes

The following is a brief resume of just some of the issues considered by Town Council since June:

Over 30 planning applications have been reviewed and issues raised related back to LDNPA.

Discussions have taken place with SLDC to attempt to secure improved security of tenure on Bowness Bay toilets which helps to cross subsidise the operation of the other 7 toilets across Bowness and Windermere.

The Council received an update from Cumbria Highways about the proposed enhancement of Glebe Road and whilst supportive in principle shared some concerns about the specific elements of the plans.

Negotiations with SLDC were ongoing regarding the future of Langstone House and the aspirations of Town Council to provide the building as a community hub rather than complex, partial conversion into affordable homes.

Consultation was undertaken with SLDC regarding the future shape of grounds maintenance in the parish following significant budget cuts by SLDC.

Roads were identified for maintenance prioritisation by Cumbria Highways in 2015/16.

Updates were received from Cumbria Police about crime related issues and actions taken.

An update was received regarding the positive future of the 597 bus service following earlier intervention by Town Council to help subsidise and safeguard the route short term.

Discussion took place regarding the second phase of LDNPA funded access improvements to effectively extend Carriage Drive to the summit of Orrest Head.

SLDC's draft Housing Strategy was commented up and issues raised reported back.

Bands officially booking the 'Bandstand' on the Glebe would be considered for receipt of a grant of between £50 to £100 to encourage increased use of the facility.

The extended showroom is due to open at the end of September.

# Shop S.O.S

Is your shop or business frontage looking tired and in need an upgrade? ### The first 100

The first WI meeting in the UK was held in Llanfairpwll on Anglesey, Wales, on 16 September 1915. Since then, the organisation has grown to become the largest women's voluntary organisation in the UK with over 212,000 members in 6,600 WIs. It is open to all women from the age of 18.

Over the 100 years key campaigns have included issues relating to Jury Service for women, better housing, provision of rural water supplies, Women Police, health screening, equal pay, farm gate milk pricing, saving bees, organ donation, protecting the ozone layer and many more.

WI's provide a rich source of experiences and knowledge passed down through generations and updated every day. The following day the team will be leaving from Ambleside in the morning and walking through Windermere before heading south along the Lake.

It would be wonderful if local people were able to come and see and support the team either in Ambleside as they start their day (Day 25 of their 72 day journey) or in Windermere at the War Memorial between 11-12pm. Every bit of encouragement will help them on their way!
