Reflecting on the past and the future

2012 saw Windermere Reflections kick into delivering 18 projects bringing long term benefits and increasing understanding of environmental issues in Windermere's catchment. Here's a taste of what they got up to and what's to come.



Practical Conservation - together with partner organisations, and lots of keen volunteers, they have been out:

- surveying and protecting Windermere's remaining reeds. They're an important habitat and suck up algal bloom feeding phosphates.
- surveying and removing invasive plants like Himalayan Balsam and Japanese Knotweed.
- planting Juniper and other trees to stabilise soil and prevent it washing into our lakes and rivers. There are lots of opportunities for you to get involved this year.

Greener Choices - Watch your doormat for the 'Love your Lakes' leaflet about how to find phosphate free laundry and dishwasher detergent and doing your bit to reduce algal blooms. They have also produced a number of booklets which can be downloaded free from their website. How about 'adopting a patch' to litter pick? They are always on the lookout for more help!

Celebrating heritage & culture - at Ambleside Roman Fort they have uncovered remains of key buildings so it's easier to see what was there and are now working on improving the way the story abouts its history and what you can see is told. The National Trust are running this project and there will be opportunities to survey and do walling work this year for those that want to get involved.

Volunteers uncovered 100s of new archaeological sites in woodlands and surveyed water mills used to wash and process sheep's wool. Windermere Reflections will be on the hunt for mining heritage this spring; places are going fast, so shout now if you want to get involved.

Caring about changes in community care

Trustees of the Bowness and Windermere Community Care Trust met in November and felt it important to widen awareness of the activities they already undertake, and those under development, that will provide benefit within our community.

The trust is actively working with partners to develop a range of projects providing services for young people and the elderly in the area. These could include a community meals service, day care for elderly people suffering with dementia and increased provision for youth activities.

As reported in previous issues, BWCCT is already managing the 8 public conveniences in the area on a not for profit social enterprise basis and, after some teething problems, everything now seems to be working well with positive comments now being received about cleanliness.

The 20p charge to use the toilets is necessary to help meet the substantial costs of cleaning and maintainance. Where would the 300,000 plus visitors who have used the toilets this year have 'spent a penny' if the toilets were not available?

However, the charge only provides a contribution towards the operating costs, with South Lakeland District Council and Windermere Town Council providing additional funding toward the project.

SLDC funding is, however, short term and when this terminates, consideration will have to be given on how to ensure the generation of sufficient revenue to maintain the toilets and enable further investment.

Toilets, such as those at Quarry Rigg, have proved busier than had been originally projected and they would benefit from extensive refurbishment. Finding the money to undertake this work will, however, present a challenge.

The trust also runs the Phoenix Centre which offers space for groups to meet and a large activity hall for dance classes and sporting activities. The Hall is also proving increasingly popular for children's parties.

Olympics inspire Juniors

Royal Windermere Yacht Club has experienced a surge of interest in their junior training programme following Team GB's fantastic success in Olympic sailing.

The Club runs 8 junior courses for children during the summer holidays, with morning and afternoon sessions spread over 4 weeks. An additional week was added last year following demand from parents and children, meaning that almost a hundred children aged 8 - 14 years were trained to RYA level 1 or beyond.

RWYC course organiser Amanda Wilson attributes this to the excitement raised by the five-medal-haul achieved by Team GB. "Even Ben Ainslie started as a beginner and who knows, we may have the future Ben Ainslie or Hannah Mills here among us". RWYC has produced notable champions, with Steve Goacher and Phil Evans three-time world champions in the Flying Fifteen class, and Andy Tunnicliffe crowned world champion (with helm lan Dobson) for the fourth time in the GP14 class last year in Cornwall.

The Club also organises fun sailing activities, races for junior sailors and their parents, along with picnics and bbq's. Seating revival



Around Windermere and Bowness there are over 171 public seats in our parks and public spaces. A recent survey found over 50 to be in dire need of repair, renovation or replacement. Age UK Village Agent Tony McMichael said, "When public spaces look cared for, right down to individual seating, it encourages everyone to care for their area. It makes for happier visitors, who are vital for our economy, as well as building pride in our community within all age groups."

Age UK Volunteers with carpentry and engineering experience have teamed up with younger people to pass on their skills and they are working together to carry out repairs or replace public seating as part of the **Save our Seats** campaign. The campaign is off to a great start, with initial funding provided through the Chief Constable's Property Fund. Working in conjunction with the local Cumbria Neighbourhood Police, the local Council and South Lakeland District Council, they will identify more seats that need TLC, arrange further funding for materials and look for a base from which the project can develop to provide opportunities for all ages to work and learn from each other to help make our local area more attractive for everyone.

Other projects that Tony is currently working on include: seated exercise classes; more opportunities for older men to share their time together and traditional dancing classes.
