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Windermere, Bowness and Beyond



2015 was a successful first year for Windermere Information, welcoming over 125,000 visitors. The centre has enjoyed working with and appreciated the support of many local businesses and attractions. Footfall has been increased by new extra services on offer, such as the convenient and secure luggage storage service, which costs just £5.00 for a large locker.

Mountain Goat, who run the centre, strongly believe that it is essential for visitors arriving in Windermere to have a friendly information centre that can help them make the most of their time in the local area. In light of the disastrous flooding that hit the area in 2015, Mountain Goat believes it is more important than ever for tourists to be encouraged to visit to the area, helping to spread the message that Cumbria is open for business.

Advertising opportunities have helped to promote a range of accommodation providers in the area, last year the centre's booking service took more than £70,000 worth of bookings for local providers.

Another service which is supporting businesses is the sale of attraction tickets, currently on sale are Windermere Lake Cruises, Dove Cottage, Blackwell Arts and Craft and Theatre by the Lake. There are still opportunities available if you wish to get involved for the season ahead.

The centre is looking forward to a busy 2016 with plans to work with Made in Cumbria, selling a range of local produce and crafts. This year will also see the relaunch of The Hungry Goat Café, focusing on a new style of service with fresh coffee and light bites, ideal for both locals and visitors.

Focus on Community Care



From Samba drumming to Windermere meals, The Phoenix Centre to Public Toilets, there is far more to the Bowness and Windermere Community Care Trust than may first meet the eye.

A visit to their website, www.bwcct.co.uk identifies the many activities that take place at The Phoenix Centre, the home of the Windermere Youth Project, Heathwaite

Junior Football Club, Windermere Sea Scouts and the Windermere Weight Training Club. The main activity hall is available for a variety of sporting activities and makes an ideal venue for children's parties, there is even space to put up a Bouncy Castle. There is a small kitchen area equipped with microwave, fridge and ready supply of boiling water. A lift also gives access for the disabled or infirm to the first floor facilities utilised by the Youth Project.

You can find out about their weekly luncheon club, held on Tuesdays at the Carver Church Hall, and information about their drop in which until recently was held at The Methodist Church on Main Road, Windermere. Whilst temporarily suspended it is hoped that a new volunteer will shortly be in place to supervise activities following retirement of the two stalwart volunteers, Gladys and Sylvia who had looked after the drop in for many years.

BWCCT also took on the challenge some years ago of maintaining the delivery of the public conveniences across Windermere and Bowness and are shortly investing in a major refurbishment of the toilets located at Quarry Rigg.

Recently the Trust funded a music project delivered by the Brewery Arts Centre at St Cuthberts School. Twenty children were given an opportunity to learn to play Samba drums with the music department from the Brewery Arts Centre over a 10 week period. This culminated in a performance by the drummers at Lakeland on Saturday 12th December, joining the rest of the school who were carol singing in the store. Peter Harrison, head teacher at St Cuthberts wishes to thank the Trust for giving his children a wonderful opportunity to play something different, to Lakeland for allowing them to showcase their skills and the staff of the Brewery Arts Centre, Kendal, for their expertise. Following the success of the Samba project a second phase funded by BWCCT will involve the children at Goodly Dale School and will start after February half term.

Residents at Alexander Court in Windermere took the BWCCT Windermere meals project a step further. They requested if Windermere School, who now cook and package the fresh meals for distribution, could make a traditional Christmas lunch for 20 residents and have them delivered to Alexander Court on one of the days on the run up to Christmas. The result was amazing, 20 residents enjoyed a lovely meal including all the trimmings made by the school. Jane Tamang the manager commented that the event was brilliant!

On Friday 18th December, Windermere School hosted a Christmas Lunch organised by BWCCT for some of the residents of Goodly Dale Cottage Homes and a number of other local community groups. The event was a great success and it is hoped that further social activities will be hosted at the School by BWCCT.

The Windermere meals project currently operates two days a week. The meals cost just £5 and are available to local residents who are aged 60yrs or over and who might not otherwise benefit from a regular cooked meal. Every meal is delivered by BWCCT volunteers to the customer's own house in special heat retention containers. The result is a piping hot and affordable three course meal. BWCCT are confident that there are more local residents that could benefit from the scheme and are asking if church or community groups can help identify residents who would benefit. A sample menu is always available to help whet the appetite.

BWCCT are actively researching other project ideas that will encourage community cohesion with specific involvement from young people and the older generations. Holocaust memorial day

A moving tribute to Alfred Huberman, one of the remarkable child Holocaust Survivors who came to the Lake District directly from the concentration camps in 1945, played a central role in Holocaust Memorial Day 2016 commemorations in Windermere.

Over 700 children and staff at the Lakes School saw the launch of the Alfred Huberman Writing Award for schools as part of the HMD 2016 commemorations. A powerful introduction to the Holocaust and Genocide by Deputy Head Teacher Mick Gallop was followed by meaningful words from Sylvia Emmott, Chair of South Lakeland District Council.

Trevor Avery, Director of Lake District Holocaust Project and recent recipient of the British Empire Medal in the New Year's Honours List 2016, offered a compelling description of the special significance of the connection between The Lakes School site and the three hundred Jewish orphans who arrived in August 1945.

The school was built on the former site of Calgarth Estate, a wartime factory workers' housing scheme, and it was to this estate that the children came and stayed for what was described as the beginning of their "recuperation".

Trevor Avery spoke of the essential importance of Holocaust Memorial Day and Holocaust Education and how the lessons that we can learn from the horrors of the Holocaust can help us all as we face up to challenges of the present day. He held up the inspirational example of the Jewish children who arrived without anything other than hope, and how the young people of today carry that hope into the future.

Alfred Huberman's wife Shirley and their daughter Caroline travelled from Brighton and were at the event. Caroline spoke movingly of her father and of his time both at Windermere and afterwards. The family has been very supportive of the Alfred Huberman Writing Award initiative and see it as a perfect way to continue Alfred's work. The school children were incredibly attentive, appreciative and a credit to themselves, the school and to the area. Blues in Bowness

THE FIFTH BOWNESS BAY BLUES WEEKEND, 18-20 MARCH 2016

Bowness Bay Blues has built a reputation as one of the most enjoyable music festivals in the Northwest. The organisers have some very special musical treats in store this year, including a Twilight Blues Cruise and a brand-new pub trail in Windermere (in addition to all the usual venues in Bowness).

There will be over 20 great acts to enjoy over the weekend, with music ranging from top-notch acoustic blues (from the likes of Al Hughes and Chris James) to scintillating electric blues-rock from outstanding performers like Paul Rose, John Verity and Simon Honeyboy Hickling. Previous festival fans will recognise some names, such as Tommy Allen, Christian Sharpe, Dean Newton and Tin Pan Alley, as well as local favourites, the Elderly Brothers.

One act that deserves special mention is the incredible Xander and the Peace Pirates, fronted by Keith Xander, who was born without a right hand and plays the guitar using a plectrum held in a split metal hook. The Pirates have shared stages with many big names, including Bon Jovi, Buddy Guy and Joe Bonamassa. Now signed to V2 Records, they have been recording their eagerly awaited debut album in Amsterdam. Look out for them on Friday 18th March.

Town Council

In January, the Town Council set its budget for the forthcoming year. This decision determined the amount that each household will pay in Council Tax towards Town Council expenditure. This year the Town Council will cost a total of £115,900 and will charge each household an average of £2.36 per month. It is considered extremely important to resident councillors that the cost is kept as low as possible, whilst enabling the very local services delivered to continue and develop.

The Council also decided on its main priorities for the year. Highlights include planting of derelict flower beds with sustainable year round colour, extending the duties of the Town Steward (Gary) to carry out more litter picking and cutting back of over-grown hedges that impinge on footpaths. You may see Gary out and about wearing his Windermere Town Council High Visibility jacket – feel free to have a word and make suggestions. Town Councillors want to build on the success of Windermere in Bloom and have recently appointed a new contractor to provide the 108 hanging baskets erected around town.

Full details of the updated Community Plan for Windermere, Bowness and Troutbeck Bridge which helps guide projects delivered by the Council can be found on the Town Council website at www.windermere-tc.gov.uk

In addition the website carries information about the range of activities undertaken by Windermere Town Council together with minutes of meetings and contact details for Councillors. There are also 6 Parish notice-boards (including one in the library), which display latest agenda and items of local interest.

Local residents are very welcome to attend meetings and there is a public speaking slot for raising issues.

Unless otherwise advertised meetings take place on the second and fourth Wednesday of every month at Langstone House, Broad Street. All meetings commence at 7.00pm.

20mph not enough

Following the feedback received during the consultation about whether or not Windermere Town Council should lobby Cumbria County Council for the introduction of 20mph zones in Windermere and Bowness the decision has been taken not to pursue the matter further.

Many relevant and useful comments were received during the consultation which prompted 95 responses, of which 52 were in favour. However, in making their decision not to pursue a campaign, consideration was given to the fact that those expressing the majority desire to see such a scheme represented less than 1% of the adult population of the town and that this did not provide a true mandate to pursue a scheme that would involve considerable expenditure of public funds.

WWII veterans



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Scoping future opportunities

An Economic Scoping report commissioned by SLDC from Douglas Wheeler Associates last year was published in December.

Responses to five key issues about the future of Windermere & Bowness were sought:

- What are the likely future local economic drivers?
- What is the vision for the Bowness & Windermere local economy?
- How complementary are Bowness & Windermere:
- Is there value in a more specific study on economic potential for the Lake?
- What is the best vehicle to coordinate local economic development across the public, private and third sectors in the local area?

The clear conclusion that emerged from the research is that Bowness and Windermere would benefit from having a succinct Economic Action Plan in place for all public, private and third sector stakeholders and not just the public sector.

To effectively address the issues identified requirement for new and strong local commitment in helping develop the future of the economy of Bowness and Windermere was proposed, one that delivers a transparent approach building trust with a focus on delivering agreed priority projects and requiring action based coordination, strong leadership and a consensus on priorities.

In essence the conclusion is that Bowness and Windermere needs 'one economic development team' drawn from elements of the public, private and third sector.

SLDC Councillor Giles Archibald attended Windermere Town Council's meeting on 13th January when the report was discussed. It was agreed with Councillor Archibald that SLDC should take forward implementation of the proposal to establish a 'Short Life' Coordinating Group' to help develop the recommendations made within the initial report and find resource to organise/commission an Economic Action Plan to develop and test the themes identified in the original report.

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Cakery bakery
