# Steamer celebrates 125th birthday!



The iconic 'steamer' MV Tern is the oldest vessel still operating on England's largest natural lake, Windermere, and celebrates her 125th birthday this June. Tern was launched on 27th June 1891 – the same year as Queen Victoria celebrated her 72nd birthday and the first ever Crufts dog show was held in the Royal Agricultural Hall.

The vessel was built by Forrest and Son, boat builders based at Wyvnhoe in Essex, and could originally carry 633 passengers. In recent years, Tern is famed for carrying the Olympic torch as part of the official relay in the run-up to the 2012 London Olympics. Tern has had a varied and interesting history throughout the 20th century. In World War II, the 'steamer' was moored at Bowness pier, where she was requisitioned as a sea cadet training ship and temporarily named HMS Undine after the submarine launched at Barrow-in-Furness.

During the filming of Arthur Ransome's 1973 Swallow and Amazons film, the crew of the Swallow narrowly missed colliding with Tern - an incident which resulted in an ad lib change in the script. Tern was also used in an episode of Agatha Christie's Poirot in 1996.


# Care Trust, schools and community

Bowness & Windermere Community Care Trust and Windermere Rotary have recently funded "The Schools United Project" with three of our local primary schools in Windermere. The project commemorates England hosting, and winning, the world cup in 1966.

Local Community Artist, Donna Campbell was commissioned to work on silk paintings with each of the three schools. Windermere Prep school were the first of the schools to take part, there were 8 children involved in the project and the work was amazing.

St Cuthberts was next followed by Goodly Dale during June. Their finished work will be on display in the Phoenix Centre over the summer holidays. The photographs show the some of the steps involved in the process.







Pupils at Goodly Dale have also been working through an African drumming project funded by BWCCT with local musician Amy Boude. The children have experienced playing djembe drums over the 10 weeks. This project follows the successful Samba drumming project at St Cuthberts last year.

BWCCT is supporting Windermere Town Council by facilitating the organisation of the litter picking project known as Winderclean. The re-established project was launched on 19th May with the help of some of the pupils from St Cuthberts School. Pupils were out and about around Princes Road and Baddeley Clock to do their bit for this campaign. More recently Windermere Scouts have also been busy litter picking to coincide with the Clean for Queen campaign.

The Care Trust is hoping to attract more local groups to participate in helping keep on top of litter as it accumulates around the Parish and is able to make available all the equipment necessary to safely pick and dispose of the rubbish collected.





The YORKSHIRE BUILDING SOCIETY kindly donated some money to the Care Trust for the purchase of seeds and compost for a gardening project known as Young Buds. Two of the local schools, St Cuthberts and Goodly Dale, have both been participating in this project and have planted Busy lizzies, Sweet Peas, Nasturtiums and Lobelia. The children have cared for the seeds and will plant out in their school beds when they are ready. The Care Trust is grateful to Mr & Mrs Young who have assisted in this project.

### Inconvenient theft

Four of the local toilets operated on behalf of Windermere Town Council by the Bowness & Windermere Community Care Trust were recently targeted by thieves who broke into the coinbox mechanisms.

The toilets at Bowness Bay, Braithwaite Fold, Rayrigg Meadow and Baddeley Clock were all affected and the cost of the damage caused was greater than the amount of 20 pence pieces stolen. It is believed that the thieves struck during the day between visits by cleaning staff with the thefts being discovered when the cash was due for collection. Removal of cash from all the toilets takes place daily, every day of the week.

#### Acres with a view

Holehird Gardens are holding an open day on Saturday 2nd July between 10am and 4pm. Come along to meet the gardeners at work in their lovely gardens!

Holehird Gardens has year round interest and covers 12 acres with spectacular views of the high fells and Lake Windermere. It is the home of the Lakeland Horticultural Society that has around 1600 members. Of these members some 200 are active volunteers. Holehird is unique in that it has no paid gardeners and relies entirely on volunteers.

The gardens are open throughout the year from dawn till dusk.

The volunteers have varying roles, including:

- Gardening developing and maintaining the gardens
- Wardening manning Reception from April till the end of October
- Running education courses and lectures
- Producing the LHS Journal, a garden guide, leaflets, and cards etc

There are tasks for all tastes, both for the fit and less fit. They maintain four National Plant Collections: Astilbe, Daboecia, Meconopsis, Polystichum. They have a plant database and computerised plant labelling and also run a specialist library and operate a Met. Office approved weather station. Plants propagated by their gardeners are on sale at the Gardens.

Today Tern sails two and a half times daily around Windermere from Easter to November ferrying passengers between Lakeside, Bowness and Ambleside.

She glides majestically along the lake, her iconic canoe shaped bow slicing effortlessly through the water - a testimony to the expertise of her Victorian builders and the dedication of her current owners Windermere Lake Cruises. Currently licensed to carry 335 passengers, she is manned by a crew of four.

Over the years she has hosted wedding parties, engagement parties, school trips, retirements and birthday parties, as well as being a 'Ghost Ship' on Halloween and carrying Santa and his elves at Christmas. There have also been a string of proposals on board and anniversaries celebrated.

# Cakeworks, Toffee Factory and Mintcake

Since the late 1800's the site now occupied by the Windermere Business Centre has been a focus of local employment. Over the years that part of the original building, now home to the Business Centre, has been modified and extended and the attached premises, understood to have once formed part of the factory, converted into cottages.



Since 1993 the first floor of the Business Centre has offered well provided individual office accommodation for a wide range of business ventures, including an important stepping stone for those seeking to move from a home based business into a credible business environment offering a 'proper' business address. During that time the ground floor has supported various business ventures from sun beds to a fitness centre, warehousing to training facilities.

Whilst the provision of individual office accommodation continues to be in demand the owners recognise that there is very limited choice locally to meet the needs of smaller business seeking to develop, or satisfying businesses that might locate to Windermere if suitable premises were available.

As a consequence an exciting investment programme is in hand that will see refurbishment of the ground floor into lettable office, meeting, interview and hot desking space. Parts of the old cake works will provide three distinct areas of self-contained open plan space of appx 62sq mts, 67sq mts and 103 sq mts that will be available individually, or in combination.

# Chris does it again

For a second year running, Ulverston's architectural metalworkers Chris Brammall have been commissioned as the 2016 Tourism Awards Designer with a brief to create an iconic and bespoke work of art to reward the achievements of the county's top tourism operators.

The hand-forged awards will this year feature one of the most iconic Lakeland landscapes – Great Gable – depicted by a copper ribbon running through the centre of a mild-steel plaque and burnished to give a distinctive mottled finish.

A traditional Lakeland slate insert by local company The Stone Workshop, scripted with the awards logo and category will add the finishing touch.

Chris Brammall commented; "I am delighted to once again be designing the Cumbria Tourism Award. This year, I've chosen to highlight my personal favourite Lake District landscape Great Gable, which for centuries has inspired many artists including myself. Each award will be individually hand-forged to create a beautiful, bespoke plaque to be proudly displayed in the award winning businesses."

This year, there are a total of sixteen Cumbria Tourism Awards categories including Wedding Venue of the Year, B&B of the Year and Guest Accommodation of the Year – all new for 2016. All of the winners will be crowned at a glitzy awards ceremony due to take place in June.

Chris Brammall lives in Windermere and is one of the leading architectural and sculptural metalworkers in Great Britain. He trained as a Blacksmith at Hereford College of Art and Design where he discovered a natural affinity for the art of blacksmithing.

From a blacksmiths forge at Graythwaite his work developed from small scale private commissions and he now leads a twenty strong team from a purpose built studio and workshop in Ulverston.

His impressive and varied portfolio of art initiatives and public realm projects includes sculptures, bridges, street furniture and bespoke architecture as well as restoration and private commissions.

Many of his most iconic sculptures can be found in public spaces throughout the UK. Cumbria commissions include The Glebe Bowness-on-Windermere, Staveley Mill Yard, White Moss Rydal and Brockhole Jetty.

# **Pounds for Millerground**

The Millerground Enhancement Group community project, led by Windermere & Bowness Civic Society, has just been awarded a grant of £50,000 from the SLDC 'Locally Important Projects' fund. In addition SLDC has also committed a further £100,000 from its capital fund for 2017/18. Together with funds already raised, this will help the Group to achieve its aims of restoring Millerground and Rayrigg Meadow.

Much work has already been done by local students and volunteers helping National Trust rangers to plant wildflowers, bluebells, daffodils, clear undergrowth and repair pathways. This money will enable the lakeshore, footpaths, picnic area and playground to be restored, making the whole area once more a welcoming and attractive place for all local residents and visitors to enjoy.

The footpath from the car park to the lakeshore will be improved to allow much easier access for pushchairs and wheelchairs, and those who find steps and gradients difficult. This will be a great benefit to assist the elderly and disabled to enjoy this location. An exciting new playground will be installed offering natural themed adventurous play for all ages and abilities.

The lakeshore around Rayrigg jetties will be substantially improved to provide family-friendly access to the edge of the lake. The view from the top of the bank will continue to be opened up and new seating and picnic benches will be installed to appreciate the view. Detailed planning and additional consultation will take place in 2016 with the main work happening in early 2017.

# Stop & go on the Glebe

The Optimising Connectivity Enhancement scheme on Glebe Road in Bowness being undertaken by Cumbria County Council has been halted and work will not start again until Autumn 2016.

The site has been made safe to enable the area to be opened up to the public. Cessation of the work follows an unexpected issue affecting United Utilities assets in the area of the works.

Given the timescales of determining satisfactory resolution to the problem, and the disruption that would be caused if construction work took place during the summer, the decision to postpone construction of the scheme seems the best solution.

In the meantime, further consultation has been undertaken on behalf of Cumbria County Council with key landowners and affected parties to draw up proposals for future enhancement to the pierhead area between the Belsfield Hotel and the lake.

We are advised that public consultation will be undertaken during the summer to determine a favoured scheme although, in advance, Cumbria County Council are submitting a funding application for the scheme to the Local Enterprise Partnership.
